Unruly Rulers

Who were the medieval (say 'med-ee-evil') kings?

Medieval means in the Middle Ages. This is roughly from when William the Conqueror and the Normans invaded England in 1066 until Henry VIII (that's the 8th) became king in 1509.



1066

William the Conqueror

He wasn't even English, he came from France.



King William II Rufus He was killed hunting.

People say that Henry I ordered it!

1087

King Henry I

He stole the throne from his older brother who was away on Crusade.



1100

King Stephen

Another king who stole the throne, it was meant to be his cousin Matilda's!

1135

King Henry II

Some of his knights heard that he was angry at Thomas Becket, the Archbishop of Canterbury. That was the end of poor Thomas, the knights killed him.



1154

King Richard I The Lion Heart

A brave king, he was always fighting a war. 1189

King John

Bad King John, he was a cruel and horrible man. He died eating too many peaches!



1199

King Henry III

He was a good king who gave money to the poor and liked to pray.

1216

King Edward I

He invaded and conquered both Wales and Scotland - ruling both of them!



1272

King Edward II

Another bad King, he only listened to his best friend Piers Gaveston and died a nasty death in a dungeon.

1307

King Edward III

He was a good king, even if he did start the 100 years' war.



1327

King Richard II

He tried to rule without parliament, so the barons helped the next Henry become king.

1377

King Henry IV

He stole the throne from Richard while he was fighting in Ireland. Hard luck Richie!



1399

King Henry V

He wanted to be King of England and France. You guessed it, he started a war! 1413



1422

King Edward IV

He secretly married Elizabeth Woodville. Some say she was a witch!

1483



King Richard III

He was a bad king. People say he had his nephews murdered in the Tower of London so he could be king instead.

2 King Henry VI

He became king at 8 months old! He was weak and hated war. He never fought in any battles.

He was 10 when he became king for 86 days. Then his uncle Richard put him and his brother in the Tower.

So, when did you become king?

I became King on 25 January 1327 when I was 14 years old.

What are you most famous for?

I started the 100 years' war with France (which actually lasted longer than 100 years!) I'm the reason England became a great military power.

Was there anything you were scared of?

The plague – fleas on rats brought the Black Death to England during my reign.

What is the naughtiest thing you've ever done?

I tried to steal the French throne from Philip V of France. I am a much better king and warrior than Philip; he doesn't deserve to rule France!



Find out about Calverley Old Hall

Calverley Old Hall was first built over 700 years ago, and was owned by the Calverley family.

The original house was much smaller than the current building and was built around 1320. This early building was 'L' shaped, and had a kitchen and servants' area downstairs, whilst the family lived upstairs in their private rooms.

If you look at Calverley Old Hall today, you will see that we are right in the middle of lots of other houses. But it would have looked very different for the Calverley family.

They were one of the richest families in the area and owned a lot of land, so Calverley Old Hall would have been surrounded by fields and farmland.


Fact: The oldest part of the building is the middle section, called the 'solar'. 'Solar' means something related to the sun. This room is called the solar because it is in the middle of the house and was supposed to be the brightest room in the building.

But it also has another possible meaning. In Latin, an old language used hundreds of years ago, 'Solus' means 'alone'. The solar was the family's private room, where they spent time alone.

Do you have a similar room at your house?



Fact: Most of the men in the Calverley family were called either William or Walter, so it gets quite confusing looking at the history books!



Unfortunately, we don't have many pictures of the Calverley family to show us what they might have looked like. This painting shows Henry Calverley, who lived here in the 1600s.



The Chapel

About 150 years after it was built, the family added a much bigger Great Hall, and their own private chapel to pray.

Fact: The Calverley family were Catholics, a Christian religion that was outlawed by Tudor King Henry VIII, who wanted everyone to become a Protestant. Over the years the family got into lots of trouble for this, and had to pay some of their money to the King as punishment. One of the family was even locked in the Tower of London until he apologised!



The Painted Chamber

Over the years, generations of Calverley's lived at Calverley Old Hall and continued to add to the building. Although the building we see today has changed quite a lot, we can see what it might have been like in Tudor times by visiting one room particularly, now known as 'The Painted hamber'.



The painted chamber was added by Sir William Calverley and was a way of showing off the Calverley family's wealth and education.

It was found underneath modern decoration in 2021 and has survived for almost 500 years!

Calverley Old Hall was once a great manor house, surrounded by fields and farmland which were also owned by the Calverley family.

The house wasn't all built at once, but each generation of the family added to it over time. The solar, which is now the living room, is the oldest section of the building, and was originally built as the family home around 1320. The Calverley family added to the house as they become more wealthy, adding a Great Hall to entertain guests and even having their own private chapel.

Although you wouldn't know it now, the house wasn't always built out of stone. In fact, the original hall built in 1320 was a 'timber framed' house, built from wood with walls made of 'wattle and daub', a kind of straw and dung mix. Smelly!

Fact:


The Great Hall, which is now the kitchen, has a **Hammerbeam roof**.

There are lots of big decorative beams or **braces** which support the weight of the roof. If you look closely, you will see wooden pegs sticking out of the beams. These do the same job as modern metal nails. If the wooden pegs become loose, you can hammer them in a little bit further to tighten things up again, instead of needing to add more nails. Clever!



Buildings can be quite easy to draw. They are usually made up from lots of geometric shapes, like squares, triangles and circles.

Take an adult with you and have a go at drawing the front of Calverley Old Hall.






Painted chamber activity


On the first floor you'll find a room with decorative wall paintings which are almost 500 years old. They are very important and very rare. The designs are hand painted onto plaster and wood, in a repeat pattern, a bit like modern wallpaper.

Remember, no pens are allowed in the painted room to protect the paintings, so do your drawing somewhere else in the building!








Design your own coat of arms

Like many rich families, the Calverley family had their own coat of arms. Each element of the design represents a particular quality or historic link.

The Calverley family's coat of arms includes a horned owl. Owls can represent wisdom and industry. The wider Leeds area was a very industrial area, and is famous for its role in cloth manufacturing. Owls also appear on the official crest of the City of Leeds.

Have a go at designing your own family crest. What is important to you? Is there something that represents the area you live in? Or your family?



Discover more about Calverley Old Hall...

Calverley Old Hall has been here for over 700 years. Follow this Quest to discover more about it.

The house has had lots of different people living here over the years. The Calverley family lived here for over 400 years.

Stand upstairs in the solar (living room). Take a look at the huge wooden beams above your head. Can you spot the carvings on them where they meet the walls? Are they all the same?

The Calverley family sold the house in the 1700s, and it was rented out to people in the village as small cottages.

Fact:

We have been able to find out when each part of the building was built by studying the wooden beams.

This is called dendrochronology, or tree ring dating. Expert scientists take small samples of wood and can find out how old they are by looking at the growth rings in the centre of the tree. They look at the thickness of each ring and compare it to a database so they can tell which years the tree was growing.

Now stand with your back to the fireplace. Can you spot the remains of the old metal gaslights that would have been used to light one of these cottages?

Fact: The Calverley family were originally called the Scot family but changed their name after moving to Calverley village. What would your name be if you changed your name to the place where you live?

Look at the picture on the right. This shows Calverley Old Hall in 1965. In the 1800s, two more cottages were built onto the front of the chapel. They were knocked down in the 1980s. Can you spot them in the picture?

With an adult, go outside and look closely at the front of the chapel.
Can you see the marks left from the cottage roofs on the Chapel above the windows?






Living in Calverley Old Hall
